From the Desk of the Pastor

- Leadership through building and oversight of the Family Ministry Team and its members, in alignment with the Trinity's mission and vision.
- Providing general direction, guidance and vision for Christian education such as Sunday school, youth fellowship, Bible studies, prayer groups and special
 programs, at times coordinating with other committees.
- Overseeing planning, coordination, volunteer recruitment and training for activities including seasonal activities (Lent/ Easter, Vacation Bible School, Fall Festival and Advent/ Christmas).
- Recruiting and providing general direction, guidance, and vision for the youth ministry with a focus on empowering youth leadership.
- Recruiting and providing general direction, guidance, and vision for children's ministry.
- Adherence, training and administration of Safe Sanctuary policies to ensure the safety of all persons.
- Administration of children and youth ministry tasks including evaluation and purchase of appropriate resources and educational materials including curriculum and supplies within budget.
- Establishing and using feedback systems for regularly assessing program effectiveness.
- Making recommendations to the Senior Pastor regarding issues that may need to be addressed for the future development of the church ministries.
- Provide leadership and methods to evaluate all ministry efforts of your team.
- Encourage the creativity and development of leadership skills in your team members

- Work with the Senior Pastor and Pastoral staff to carry out the mission and vision of Trinity Church.
- Expected to have regular office hours (to be determined).
- Expected to be visible and active in the community (attending games, and community events.)

2022 Charitable Donations

For your donations to be recorded as 2022 giving, the church must either receive your donation in the church office or offering plate by December 31, 2022, or it can be mailed, but must be **postmarked by December 31, 2022.**

If you want to give cash to the church, please use your giving envelopes or otherwise identify the cash so that your donations can be recorded and reported to you on a statement from the church. Since 2007, in order to claim any charitable deduction on your taxes, you must be able to show a bank record of the donation, such as a canceled check or a written communication from the charity that includes the charity's name, date of the donation and the amount.

We have a generous church, and we want to make sure you get tax credit for giving.

Our church is truly blessed to have so many members who generously support our mission and ministry to those in need. If you're looking for an opportunity to make a difference in the lives of worthy, disadvantaged souls, we would welcome your participation.

Salisbury Urban Ministries (SUM) Update

Donations for the Holidays

Where has the year gone? It's November and Thanksgiving is right around the corner with Christmas close behind! With the holidays approaching, the Lazarus Food Pantry is looking for items to fill the Holiday Bags so their clients can know the blessings of the Seasonal Meals as well as being Thankful for God's Blessings.

Donations are being requested for this worthy cause. For the Food Pantry, canned yams, sweet potatoes, and desserts are suggested. Hostess Snack Cakes would be great for the Kid's Cafe with gloves being the ideal gift for the Men's Welcome Center. As in the past, the Trinity Family can make their donations each Sunday morning by placing them in the Lazarus Containers located both in the Downtown Sanctuary and the Family Life Center. Donations can also be dropped off at the SUM Building on Barclay Street. Holiday donations should be in by December 16th.

Lazarus Food Pantry

The Lazarus Food Pantry gave out 482 bags of food this past August with the Eastern County Pantries giving out 62 additional ones. Trinity as been an issue integral part of this ministry over the years. The last few weeks we have been averaging 20 or more donations per Sunday. Donations are needed more than ever due to food price increases, an increase of need, and donations overall being down across the Community.

Prescription Program

The Prescription Program has also been active for SUM clients. If you know anyone that might need help with prescription prices, refer them to SUM.

SUM Budget

As of August 15, SUM has reached its 8 month point or 67.6% of the 22 Plan. Even with donations down somewhat, SUM is still in the Black not the Red. Total Income is up by 76.6% or 5% above Plan with Expenses at 64.49 % or 3% below Plan. Fundraising and grants received has helped with this.

Anne Street Tiny Houses

SUM has reported that 24 Tiny Houses have been put up for the homeless on Anne Street behind the SUM Building. This development should open November 1. Various churches, including the United Methodist Women of Trinity, are sponsoring a house for \$500. The Food Pantry will be available for bags of food.

Lease Agreement

The Lease Agreement between SUM and Grace UMC has been extended. Two security cameras were also donated for the property.

Programing

Programs of SUM are progressing steadily. As with the Pantry, God's Kitchen which serves lunches each Saturday at Grace, has been steadily increasing it numbers back to pre-Covid levels. A few Saturdays ago, they had 110 clients served by area Churches, including Trinity. This was the most since Covid. SUM has also provided bags of food for an Asbury UMC sponsored Afghan family.

Kid's Café

The Kid's Café had a great Summer Program with mentoring, games, field trips, food and the YMCA Camp. The Fall Program started in September with 13 full-time students after school. WMDT TV even did a short video of the Café. Through the generosity of Church members including Trinity, donations of over \$3690 were raised for school clothes and supplies. Each student received two outfits and a back bag filled with supplies. Enough money was left over for winter coats for each later in the year.

Men's Welcome Center

The Men's Welcome Center reopened August 15 for homeless men to bathe and wash their clothes each Saturday morning. Snacks are provided and lunch served at God's Kitchen.

Staffing

SUM has also brought on a new Assistant Coordinator for the Kid's Café, a new Food Pantry Director, and a new AmeriCorps worker for year.

Salisbury Urban Ministries as you can see is a very active in helping those in need. None of the Programs would be possible without the help of the Community, such as you the Trinity Family. Donations of food, clothing and money are always welcomed. Volunteers are always needed in the various programs to keep them running. You might have a talent that could be used by God to strengthen SUM. Please support the fundraisers such as "Coins for a Change"; "The Fall Letter Campaign"; "The Soup-er Bowl Contest"; and "The Care for the Cause" to be held in February '23 at Christ UMC. And , of course, prayer for God's guidance is always needed.

Thank you Trinity for All you do to help SUM successfully serve the less fortunate of God's Children.

<u>God's Kitchen</u>, which serves lunches each Saturday at Grace Church, has been steadily increasing it numbers back to pre COVID levels. Area churches, including Trinity, have been serving 100+ clients.

<u>HALO Café</u> - Robin Ritchie and Maureen Williams reported the HALO Café will open back up for in-person dining on November 1st. The once monthly Monday team is in need of additional volunteers. The ASP team will begin serving again on the 1st and 4th Thursday of the month.

<u>ASP</u> team leaders David Phippin and Bryan Ashby held their annual kick-off meeting on September 25th and are looking forward to another season of service in the local community and in Appalachia next June. The team will be holding a fundraiser this year.

<u>Joseph House</u> - Trinity continues to provide 40 lunches to the day program at the **Joseph House** the third Wednesday of each month. Maureen is looking for additional volunteers to help 3-4 times per year.

Beyond Your Walls - Trinity members area also providing 30 lunches for the **Beyond Your Walls** program the 2nd Tuesday of the month to homeless persons waiting to use the mobile shower. Ten families have signed up so each family will be contacted twice a year to prepare and drop off 15 bagged lunches and drinks. The shower is parked behind Wicomico Presbyterian Church every Tuesday from 1:00-4:30. Contact Maureen if you want to volunteer.

<u>The Hearts & Hands Ending Homelessness</u> emergency shelter located at the Park Seventh Day Adventist Church on John Deere Drive will be open beginning November 12th. Maureen will do a Mission Moment at both services on November 13th. Volunteers are needed to prepare dinner, provide breakfast and lunch fixings and be at the shelter during the evenings and overnight.

T-CAP

Choices staff enjoyed a back-to-school luncheon to celebrate the opening of the new school year. Monogramed school shirts were given to all new staff members.

On October 5, Pastor Hayden visited Choices Academy. Courtney Elliott, the Principal, took Pastor Hayden on a tour of the buildings and then they met in Mrs. Elliott's office. Pastor Hayden is planning to meet with the new Superintendent, Micah Stauffer, to discuss ideas shared at this meeting to benefit students at Choices.

T-CAP members will continue to provide prayer for staff around the flagpole twice per month.

On November 4, several T-CAP members will work with students at the school putting "No Sew" Blankets together.

Since students love gift cards that are given as incentives for attendance and/or positive behavior, we are going to provide twenty \$10 gift cards to be used for that purpose.

The administration is discussing the **possibility** of having a Christmas Bazaar as they have done in the past. The congregation has been very supportive of this project. Please start looking for gently used or new items around your house that you would like to donate to the school. Students will be allowed to select items as Christmas gifts for members of their family. Each gift will be wrapped by volunteers. **An announcement will be put in the bulletin if the decision to go ahead with the bazaar is made. Please do not send any items to the church until that announcement is made.**

Ministry Opportunity

With all the great work that the ministry team at HALO does for those in need in our community, they also have a worship service every week for their residents who are staying at their facility. We have been asked to provide a worship service for them once a month, so beginning on December 11, Trinity will be providing worship on the second Sunday of the month! If you are interested in serving the homeless in this way, please contact Pastor Hayden for more details.



Santa's Angels

Santa's Angels began 33 years ago with a local family who wanted to show their two daughters how blessed they were. The family blessed three families that year with Christmas and have continued to do so each year with the creation of Santa's Angels. Last year, 145 families were blessed by Santa's Angels. The families are selected through the school system and receive gifts, food, and a Bible marked to the Christmas Story. This year we will have a list with specific types of toys that are needed and used to fill Christ-

mas lists, as well as used for extra gifts that are taken out by the Santas and their elves on their routes. If you wish to donate monetarily, please make your check payable to Santa's Angels and drop it off in the church office. All donations and unwrapped gifts are due back to the church by Sunday, December 11, 2022. Volunteers are also needed for shopping, wrapping, and delivery. If you wish to help load and deliver, we will be delivering on Saturday, December 24, 2022 between 7:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. All routes leave from the Family Life Center. National Caregiver Month

Health Outreach Ministry

November is National Caregiver Month. The National Alliance for Caregiving (NAC) & American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) noted in their recent publication that about 50 million Americans (23%) were family caregivers in 2020 – a 9.5% increase from 2015. Caregiving touches all ages, racial groups, income levels, types of families, belief systems, and other demographics. Caregivers report that persons who need & receive care have increasing physical, mental/emotional, and memory needs – often with more than one need. More Americans report unpaid caregiving - often without adequate/affordable services and support. Caregivers report that their caregiving situations are fragmented, uncoordinated, dispersed, costly, and stressful. Importantly, family caregivers' health has declined. This article offers information about a few caregiver resources.

National Family Caregivers Association (NFCA)/Caregiver Action Network (CAN) offers numerous resources such as a toolbox, tips, online chat, caregiver stories, & caregiving per condition for new to seasoned caregivers. Suggested steps: **Make** a list of current diagnoses and needs. **Explore** local and national resources. **Reach out** to family, friends, clergy, support groups, primary and specialized professional providers, emotional/mental health resources, social workers, food services, transportation, medical and public health centers, specialty organizations, government and social care agencies, and financial and legal agencies. **Develop** a plan. **Discuss and measure** goals periodically. **Seek** ongoing caregiver support and respite.

Increasing Number of Older Adults

The increase in the number of older adults in the United States is unprecedented. In 2019, 54.1 million US adults were 65 or older, representing 16% of the population—or more than 1 in every 7 Americans. Nearly 1 in 4 older adults are members of a racial or ethnic minority group.

By 2040, the number of older adults is expected to reach 80.8 million. By 2060, it will reach 94.7 million, and older adults will make up nearly 25% of the US population.

Aging increases the risk of chronic diseases such as dementias, heart disease, type 2 diabetes, arthritis, and cancer. These are the nation's leading drivers of illness, disability, death, and health care costs. The risk of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias increases with age, and these conditions are most common in adults 65 and older. In 2021, health care and long-term care costs associated with Alzheimer's and other dementias were \$355 billion, making them some of the costliest conditions to society.

CDC's <u>National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion</u> funds partners to improve the health of older adults by:

• Helping those with dementia remain active, independent, and involved in their community as long as possible.

- Providing resources to help caregivers stay healthy and deliver quality care to their care recipients.
- Increasing early assessment and diagnosis, risk reduction, and prevention and management of chronic diseases for people with or at risk of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.
- Increasing the use of other clinical preventive services like blood pressure checks, cancer screenings, and blood sugar testing.
- Increasing the number of people who speak to a health care provider about their worsening memory.
- Providing the National Diabetes Prevention Program (National DPP) lifestyle change program to Medicare beneficiaries through CDC-recognized organizations to reduce the risk of type 2 diabetes. Promoting physical activity programs to reduce the risk of dementia and arthritis pain.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Pumpkin Cake

Ingredients

2 cups (250g) all-purpose flour (spoon & leveled)

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon salt

1 and 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

2 teaspoons store-bought or homemade <u>pumpkin pie spice</u>

1 cup (240ml) canola or vegetable oil

4 large eggs

1 cup (200g) packed light or dark brown sugar

1/2 cup (100g) granulated sugar

1 (15 ounce) can pumpkin puree

1 and 1/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract



Cream Cheese Frosting

8 ounces (224g) full-fat block cream cheese, softened to room temperature

1/2 cup (115g) unsalted butter, softened to room temperature

3 cups (360g) confectioners' sugar, plus an extra 1/4 cup if needed

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1/8 teaspoon salt

- Preheat the oven to 350°F (177°C) and grease a 9×13 inch baking pan. I always use a glass pan. Whisk the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, and pumpkin pie spice together in a large bowl. Set aside. Whisk the oil, eggs, brown sugar, granulated sugar, pumpkin, and vanilla extract together until combined. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients and use a mixer or whisk until completely combined. Batter will be thick.
- Spread batter into the prepared pan. Bake for 30-36 minutes. Baking times vary, so keep an eye on yours. The cake is done when a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. If you find the top or edges of the cake is/are browning too quickly in the oven, loosely cover it with aluminum foil.
- Remove the cake from the oven and set the entire pan on a wire rack. Allow to cool completely. After about
 45 minutes, I usually place the cake in the refrigerator to speed things up.
- Make the frosting: In a large bowl using a handheld or stand mixer fitted with a paddle or whisk attachment, beat the cream cheese and butter together on high speed until smooth and creamy. Add 3 cups confectioners' sugar, vanilla, and salt. Beat on low speed for 30 seconds, then switch to high speed and beat for 2 minutes. If you want the frosting a little thicker, add the extra 1/4 cup of confectioners sugar (I add it). Spread the frosting on the cooled cake. Refrigerate for 30 minutes before serving. This helps sets the frosting and makes cutting easier. Cover leftover cake tightly and store in the refrigerator for 5 days.
