FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

1 Timothy 2:1-2 First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity.

I am so thankful for our prayer team at Trinity. Last year, after preaching about the importance and efficacy of prayer I asked Ruth Ann Savage to lead Trinity's prayer group. Once she accepted that role, she told me that it had actually been a sort of calling on her life for quite some time and she was glad for the opportunity to step into God's calling for her.

Every two weeks we meet to pray about the concerns that people turn in to us through prayer cards in the pews, Connect Cards at the Family Life Center, phone calls, visits, emails, and even through a form on our website. Ruth Ann compiles a list to ensure that each concern or person is mentioned in prayer that week. Then she chooses who will receive a blessing card informing them that we have prayed for them today. We pray for all the names but do not send the cards to the same people each week. Each card is signed by all who were in attendance. Currently there are between six and ten each time we meet.

We also take time each session to have a devotion and usually a song or two so we can truly be in worship together. And we pray for the church. We pray for Trinity, we pray for our committees, our events, our leaders, our staff our projects and all the ministries to which we are connected. And then we pray for our communities, our families, our nation, our rulers, our society, and our world. There are so many things to pray for.

No one is pressured to pray but everyone is invited to pray.

And often we hear stories of how our prayers have been effective in the lives of those whom we have lifted in prayer. Often from far away.

Never underestimate the importance of being prayed for.

I have noticed on more than one occasion as I visit a shut-in that they have their prayer card prominently displayed. They are glad that they have been prayed for. Often times there are cards from many Trinity members on display, who have prayed for the individual and have sent a card.

When I was 21, I took a summer missionary trip to Phoenix, Arizona. Of course I asked everyone I knew to pray for me. When I returned at the end of the summer I visited a church in Baltimore, which was about sixty miles away from where I lived at the time. On the back of their bulletin was their prayer list and I was floored to see my name on it. They had been praying for me, and they didn't even know me. It still warms my heart. To me, one of the best ways to care about someone, is to pray for them, even if you don't know them. Because the one we pray to, certainly does!

So make sure you check the prayer list each week, and pray for those, even if you don't know them. And if you find the time, come pray with the prayer group. It will be a blessing for you and for others.

What is it?

Readiness 360 is an online tool used to measure & strengthen the four areas of "multiplication DNA" - its capacity to multiply like the church in the book of Acts. Readiness 360 will uncover beliefs and behaviors in your faith community that will either accelerate or slow down your ability to grow and multiply. Readiness 360 measures "multiplication DNA" by assessing four areas (listed below) present in faith communities. These 4 areas are the building blocks that multiply a faith community's witness and impact. Readiness 360 has been designed to give useful feedback for congregations to understand how ready they are to embark on a new initiative that creates new places -- inside and outside the walls of the church -- for new people in a wide variety of approaches.

The 4 Theme Areas in Detail



Spiritual Intensity.

All of the great church movements worldwide are intense spiritually, marked by a deep love for God and a surrendering to what God is seeking to do through human beings. Understanding the degree to which a spiritual fire burns within the hearts and souls of those leading and participating in the life of the church is critical. Is your congregation driven by its passion for Christ?



Dynamic Relationships.

Good habits and skills for leading new persons into a deeper relationship with God through Christ is vital. Healthy congregations work as a system to accomplish this. Your relationships with others directly impact the strength of your evangelism muscle. How dynamic and healthy are your relationships with those inside and outside your church?



Missional Alignment.

The degree to which a church consistently prioritizes investment of its resources (time, talent, treasure) according to a biblical vision and mission indicates readiness in this dimension. It is critical that your church's plans, major initiatives and pruning of ministry stem clearly from a biblical vision/mission and drive for fruitfulness instead of from habit. Does your activity flow from your stated values?



Cultural Openness.

Since the first century, effective churches have been reaching across cultural boundaries to share the Christian good news with diverse people, who begin with different experiences, perspectives, and stories. Churches that exhibit fortress behaviors or who spend excessive time mourning social change often have difficulty sharing life with new kinds of people. Does your congregation exhibit a capacity for embracing people from diverse cultures?

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

- You must be a member (if you are not now, you can join during the year.)
- You must attend worship service regularly. (We require at least once a month attendance in worship. Serving in the nursery or Sunday School does not count toward this goal.)
- You must fill out an application and submit it by April 1st. The applications are through the Community Foundation of the Eastern Shore and can also be obtained through the office.

If you have met all those requirements, our scholarship committee will review your application and consider granting you funds to help you further your education!

PSALM 23:1; 4. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want...Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me..."

ISAIAH. 40:8. "The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of God endures forever..."

Fall is almost here, with the exception of Spring, my favorite season. It is a transitional period, where we witness the beauty of the changing colors of the leaves as they fall, coating the ground in layers of gold and red. The falling leaves, shorter days, and cooler temperatures remind us that Summer is over with the darkness of winter ahead.

I don't know about you, but I'm kind of glad to say goodbye to the Summer of 2025. Even though it gave us some good times, the heat and humidity seemed at times unbearable. The Summer bombarded us 24/7 by the doom and gloom generated by the news and social media! Everywhere you turned, it seemed death and destruction followed. Crime, riots, hate, natural disasters (floods, fires, tornadoes, volcanos, etc) touched many. I thought growing up as a teenager in the "turbulent" 1960s was hard, but it was a "piece of cake" compared to what young people face today. Some of the same problems, but magnified ten fold by the internet and the media. Where have the values and the role models gone? Bullying over personal opinions; name calling; and even cursing openly, even by our politicians (I suspended kids as a assistant principal for this) seems to be the norm. At times, it seemed like Darkness was winning and overspreading the World!

But then I remember: while the seasons change, One thing always stays the same, that being "Hope through Jesus"! My parents taught me that "God is in control at all times! Put your trust in Him, love Him, and pray to him. He will guide you through life". As I learned Psalm 23 in Sunday School, "The Lord is my shepherd..." and "...His Word endures forever!" God got me through the 1960s; God gets me through today; and God will get future generations and us through the darkness! You only have to Believe!

I looked on the internet and found a true story of goodness that truly exemplifies that God does intervene in our lives. (If you look hard enough, you'll find the good outshines the gloom just as Jesus shines through the Darkness and Spring follows Winter!) The book authored by Michael Hingson with Susan Flory was titled "Thunder Dog" published in 2011.

Like me, Michael Hingson is a Baby Boomer, both of us being born in 1950! His parents like mine taught him to pray and that God is in control. Psalm 23 is also his favorite scripture. However, Michael was born blind! This is the true story of God guiding Michael through the darkness using his dog, Roselle.

At the very instant I started my first full week as Principal at Wicomico Middle School, Michael was arriving at his work at 7 am with his guide dog, Roselle, hundreds of miles away. He met his friend, David, early to prepare for a big investment meeting that day. His offices were located on the 78th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center. The date was September 11, 2021. Since a storm the night before had scared Roselle and kept Michael awake 3 hours giving comfort, his beloved dog took a nap under his desk while he worked.

At approximately 8:26 am, there was a big "Boom" that shook the building. Being blind, Michael could not see the flames or debris falling outside his windows. He could feel the building swaying and leaning 20 feet as well as hear the chaos/screams. He prayed, "God don't let this building tip over!" David and he tearfully said their goodbyes. The building straightened; Roselle, his "thunder fearing guide dog", awoke from her nap, remaining calm and showing no fear. It was then that Michael knew there was a chance. After getting all the coworkers out, with Roselle in the lead began guiding them down the 1,463 steps, through the jet fuel, blooded victims, and erupting panic. At one point, David lost hope, shouting "We're not going to make it!" Michael gently said, "If Roselle and I can do it, so can you"!

Roselle steadily guided them down. At the 39th floor, firefighters stopped them to inquire about their safety One firefighter rubbed Roselle's ear and she licked his hand, the last act of love that the firefighter probably felt before his death! An hour later with just minutes to spare before the Towers collapsed, they reached the lobby. Just as they started out the door, the South Tower was attacked. Within 10 seconds it started to fall with glass, metal, fire, and dust pounding down on Michael's group. With Roselle in the lead, they ran through the darkness, choking on the rolling dust.

It was at this time that God talked to Michael. In his own words from page 110 of his book, Michael wrote:

Roselle and I run away from the noise. I don't understand why this is happening. My heart cries out to God in anguish. "How could you get us out of the building just to have it fall on us?" As soon as I silently scream out the question, God answers...inside my head and heart. He speaks directly to me. "Don't worry about what you cannot control. Focus on running with Roselle, and the rest will take care of itself"...Gods voice so close and so clear. Immediately I feel peace and a sense of protection. My mind and heart begin to settle down ,and I start to focus on Roselle. The harness feels solid in my hand, and our bond is sure...Now I am more stronger and more confident. I know that beyond any shadow of doubt that God is directing me just as I direct Roselle".

With God in control and Roselle leading, Michael soon finds safety. Roselle and he sleep a good sleep that night in their own bed. Roselle is honored and lives 10 more years until she dies in 2011 due to problems caused by smoke inhalation from 9/11. Michael now retired continues to advocate for the disabled and guide dogs.

As Michael points out, "God gives us challenges, wants for us to overcome them and then Rejoices"! With the changing of the Season, may we be like Michael and Roselle spreading God's Love and Comfort to others. Love one another; pray for one another; and help one another. Trinity with its programs and Missions give us the opportunity to spread His Word so His Light always overcomes the Darkness thrown in our paths. Pray for and help if possible the Missions like Salisbury Urban Ministries, T-Cap, Joseph's House, Santa's Angels, HALO, HOPE, and Hands & Hearts for the Homeless. As a childhood friend of mine said recently, ..."Never forget that in the difficult moments of your life, that is when God is closest to you. When you feel you're "Drowning" in life situations, don't worry. Your Lifeguard Walks on Water!" Amen....May we spread the Light of Jesus!









Members of Trinity have been active this summer giving time, donations, and monetary gifts. Many have been active in the Programs, Parish Council, and Projects of SUM. Highlights are:

- 10-12 members help with the Lazarus Food Pantry preparing and distributing bags of food on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Trinity continues to donate food each Sunday (15-20 items each Sunday on average) and money periodically. In June the Pantry gave out 350 bags of food to 366 clients in need.
- A group of Trinity UM Men have helped to unload the Maryland Food Bank Truck the 3rd Tuesday of each month during the summer. One member of the Trinity UMM helped with projects in the building including remodeling a bathroom.
- The Trinity UM Women and Men continue to help to prepare/distribute bag lunches at God's Kitchen on two Saturdays per year, the next being Saturday, September 13th, 2025, from 9:00 am-12:00 noon.
- The Spring Letter Campaign was successful in raising funds to buy food for the Pantry.
- Future Fundraisers to look for:
 - 1. July-August 20th: Monetary donations will be taken for the Kid's Café school/ supplies and clothing (see Bulletin for information).
 - 2. August: This will be Dental Hygiene Month with monetary and product donations for families.
 - 3. Fall Letter Campaign: TBA



First Aid Kit Information Health Outreach Ministry

NOTE: This article contains basic/general information. Be sure to buy or assemble a kit(s) that best fits the needs of your family and situation (house, car, work, school, college, sports, travel, hobbies, camping, ages/numbers of persons, special needs, allergies to materials or meds, etc.).

WHAT IS FIRST AID? the immediate care/assistance given to any person who is suddenly not feeling well or is injured; the care aims to preserve life, prevent the condition from worsening, and promote recovery until professional medical care arrives (OSHA). WHAT IS A FIRST AID KIT? a collection of supplies and equipment to give immediate medical treatment that treats injuries and other mild/moderate medical conditions (OSHA). So, a first aid kit can "prepare" you for emergency situations and "act" as a personal safety measure.

WHAT ARE "BASIC" CONTENTS FOR FIRST AID KITS? List of Emergency Numbers: First Aid Guidebook insert: Hand Sanitizer: Use to avoid the transmission of bacteria and viruses; apply before and after putting on gloves Latex Free Gloves: Protect the first aider from infection and cross-contamination Sterile Alcohol Pads: Protect the body from potentially harmful germs; disinfect minor injuries (cuts) Antibiotic Ointment: Apply on top of the skin to kill bacteria; make faster healing; Clean the area before applying Sting Relief: Provide relief from the pain, itching and discomfort that result from bug bites and stings Adhesive Bandages & Gauze: Absorb blood, compress, help prevent infection, and limit movement in the wound area; Gauze is thin and made of cotton and requires an adhesive to keep it in place Scissors: cut gauze & tape Q-tips: Apply ointment or clean areas to prepare for treatment Tweezers: Pull out splinters or insect stinger; Pick up unclean materials such as bloody bandages Pain Reliever: Over-the-counter medicines to relieve pain, fever (such as Acetaminophen [Tylenol] Ibuprofen [Advil & Motrin]. Read & follow dosage recommendations. EXAMPLE of kit contents for family of four (American Red Cross) @ Make a First Aid Kit | Supplies & Contents | American Red Cross

WHAT ARE STEPS TO USE KIT? Label clearly; Teach family, work, etc. about first aid, about kit and location(s), how to use kit, when to call 911; Store in safe and accessible location; Check kit (routine checks, re-check after use); Maintain kit (replace outdated, soiled contents, add new contents as needs change). Additional Tips: Take a first aid class Note location of first aid kits when you enter buildings, schools, work, churches, travel, etc.
